


# MATTHEWIS PERSEN HOUSE

amed after its longest resident, Matthewis Persen (1739-1819), the Persen House is located within Kingston's Stockade National Historic District. Its earliest portions date from c.1661 and it is one of four landmark buildings on each corner of John and Crown Streets. Each house at this intersection pre-dates the Revolutionary War.

This neighborhood was established just a few years before the Persen House began construction. In 1658, a group of 60-70 European settlers living along the Esopus Creek moved to the bluff above and built the 1,200 x 1,300 foot wall from tree trunks pounded into the ground. The streets of the original village remain laid out just as they were in 1658. (see next page for map)

Ister County welcomes you to the Persen House, one of our oldest and most significant buildings. This house has witnessed so many important moments in Ulster County's history. It was burnt at least twice, saw wars and revolution, and was home to doctors, tailors, grocers, druggists, and innkeepers.

The Persen House has been owned by Ulster County Government since 1914 and was used as the office for Cornell Cooperative Extension agricultural services. The restoration began in 1999 after the occupants were moved out due to structural instability.

Ulster County's extensive restoration took years and uncovered over 20,000 archaeological artifacts. These were meticulously catalogued and archived. Several objects are on display in the house. This tour is designed to take you chronologically through each phase of the building's history.

As we walk through the building, we walk through time. Each section was built in a different period, five phases, and the restoration was carefully done to respect and reveal this history.



The general floor plan above shows the five chronological "phases" in which the Persen House was built.

## PHASE 1 (C. 1661-1669)

Built of wood on a stone foundation in 1661, the house was burnt in the second Esopus War and rebuilt in stone probably that same year. All living, eating and sleeping happened in this one room dwelling with a cellar below and loft above for storing valuable farm products. Gysbert Van Imbroch, a surgeon from New Amsterdam, occupied this house. There were about 50 houses within the stockade. This corner of John and Crown Street is occupied by four Pre-Revolutionary stone structures.


Restoration work was made possible in part by the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation through a grant from the Environmental Protection Fund.

## PHASE 2 (C. 1669-1720)

This stone addition was added to the earlier structure circa 1669-1720s. It too has a cellar and loft, accessed first by ladder, then by a stairwell, after the loft area was converted to living space. Doctor John Goodwin kept an office here in the early 1800s. He may have installed the French wallpaper, as seen over the hallway door. The window to the right of the English fireplace had been a door to an open porch, long since removed. Replacement beams were fit to the deflected floor. A timber framed wall shows brick infill and framed openings to Phase 3.

## PHASE 3 (C. 1698-1735)

It was discovered that this area was once a woodframed barn/kitchen/scullery and attached to Phase 2 by a hand-hewn stud wall and infilled with soft handmade bricks. Second floor framing revealed an opening for a large fireplace structure rebuilt here as a typical jambless 17th century Dutch fireplace. This phase was built without a cellar, making the dirt floor the original height of uptown Kingston's streets. Since the dirt floor was undisturbed, this is where an archaeological dig discovered over 20,000 artifacts, including burn layers of both the 1663 and the 1777 conflagrations, and a posthole from the 1661 stockade expansion.





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## PHASE 4 (C. 1735-1922)

Here the house came into the possession of the Persen family. Cornelius Persen, Matthewis' father, and his brother Adam ran a tailor shop out of the house. Later, the two-family house was converted to a single family. By the late 1700s, Matthewis Persen opened a public house/tavern and this room, along with its upstairs, became the main rooms of the inn. Ulster County acquired the site in 1914 for use by the Farm & Extension Services. This area and others were partitioned into office spaces.

## PHASE 5 (C. 1922-1999)

A two-story brick addition was added by Ulster County in 1922. Certain stone walls and framing details of the house were altered or removed to accommodate the addition. Decisions of the time were economic, not historical. The building became offices for the local 4-H Club, the Agricultural Department, the forerunner of the Cornell Cooperative Extension, and various other departments and offices.

The Persen House sits right in the middle of the Uptown Kingston Stockade National Historic District, one of the oldest neighborhoods in America. While you're in Kingston, complete your visit with a walk through time.



# ULSTER COUNTY is alive with history

Ulster County is rich with industrial, recreational, agricultural, and architectural heritage. The National Register of Historic Places lists over 160 sites and 27 historic districts in Ulster County, including Old Hurley, Huguenot Street in New Paltz, Saugerties Village, Pine Hill in Shandaken, and Kingston's various districts. Our industrial heritage is also a great asset, from the cement mines in Rosendale, bluestone operations in the Catskills, and brick industry on the Hudson, to the historic railroads and waterways such as the Catskill Mountain RR and the D&H Canal. The diversity of our history is notable, with Native American, Dutch and British settlements, as well as the home of many generations of immigrants.



Kingston is the home of the Hudson Valley's oldest existing synagogue.

This was also the home of African-American abolitionist and women's rights activist Sojourner Truth.
